THE FRESHWATER FISHERIES REGULATIONS (WELLINGTON) MODIFICATION NOTICE 1961

PURSUANT to the Fisheries Act 1908 and the Freshwater Fisheries Regulations 1951, the Minister of Marine hereby gives the following notice.

NOTICE

1. This notice may be cited as the Freshwater Fisheries Regulations (Wellington) Modification Notice 1961.

2. This notice shall come into force on the day after the date of its notification in the *Gazette*.

3. This notice shall be in force only within the Wellington Acclimatisation District.

4. The Freshwater Fisheries Regulations 1951* are hereby modified as follows:

Limit Bag

(a) No person shall on any one day take or kill more than 20 acclimatised fish (being trout or salmon), of which not more than 12 may be trout:

Size Limit

(b) No person shall take or kill in any manner whatever or intentionally have in his possession any trout that does not exceed 9 in. in length:

Restrictions on Lures and Methods

(c) No person over 17 years of age in fishing for acclimatised fish shall use-

(i) Any gaff:

(ii) Any sinker of a greater weight than 1 oz., unless he is fishing for perch in the Tauherenikau River below the Featherston-Martinborough Road bridge, the Raumahunga River below the Kahutara Road bridge, or in Lake Wairarapa or the lagoons adjacent thereto:

(iii) In any river or water specified in column 1 of the Schedule hereto any lure or bait other than a lure or bait specified against that river or water in column 2 of that Schedule:

(d) No person under 17 years of age in fishing for acclimatised fish in any of the waters specified in column 1 of the Schedule hereto that are specified for artificial fly only in column 2 of that Schedule shall use any lure or bait other than artificial fly.

5. The Freshwater Fisheries Regulations (Wellington) Modification Notice 1958* is hereby revoked.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the notice, but is intended to indicate its general effect. Except as varied by Modification Notices of local application, the Freshwater Fisheries Regulations 1951 provide, inter alia, that—

- (a) The *limit bag*, which is the maximum number of acclimatised fish to be taken by one person in one day computed from midnight to midnight, shall be 50:
- (b) The size limit, which is the minimum size of fish lawfully takeable, measured from tip of nose to tip of tail, shall be 6 in. for trout and salmon. Undersized fish must be released unharmed and are not reckoned in the limit bag:
- (c) Only artificial or natural fly, insect, worm, crustacea, or fish are lawful lures or baits for acclimatised fish. Shellfish (mollusca) and fish roe are illegal. Not more than two lures or baits may be used. Artificial flies, which include feathered lures, must have only one hook. In waters restricted to fly, no weight or loaded lure is permitted. Any weight must be affixed above any lure or bait, and, with artificial minnow (which includes spoon), at least 15 in. above.
- (d) The duration of the open season for acclimatised fish is from 1 October to 30 April.

This notice modifies the general regulations in the Wellington Acclimatisation District by providing that the bag limit of 20 fish is not to include more than 12 trout, increasing the size limit in respect of perch, and restricting the lures and methods that may be used in certain waters.
