



**THE FOREST PRODUCE IMPORT AND EXPORT  
REGULATIONS 1989, AMENDMENT NO. 2**

ORDER IN COUNCIL

At Wellington this 9th day of March 1992

THE RIGHT HON. W. F. BIRCH PRESIDING IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to the Forests Act 1949, Her Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following regulations.

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REGULATIONS

**1. Title and commencement**—(1) These regulations may be cited as the Forest Produce Import and Export Regulations 1989, Amendment No. 2, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Forest Produce Import and Export Regulations 1989\* (hereinafter referred to as the principal regulations).

(2) These regulations shall come into force on the 28th day after the date of their notification in the *Gazette*.

**2. Interpretation**—(1) Regulation 2 (1) of the principal regulations is hereby amended by inserting, after the definition of the term “FCL”, the following definition:

“‘Freight forwarder’ means a person who receives imported goods for forwarding to a consignee:”.

(2) Regulation 2 (1) of the principal regulations is hereby amended by revoking the definition of the term “LCL”, and substituting the following definition:

“‘LCL’ means a container holding goods for more than one consignee; and includes a container holding goods that are to be delivered to, or are received by, a freight forwarder for forwarding to 2 or more consignees:”.

**3. Costs of inspection**—Regulation 16 of the principal regulations is hereby amended by inserting, after the words “the costs of inspection”, the words “and clearance”.

**4. New Second Schedule substituted**—(1) The principal regulations are hereby amended by revoking the Second Schedule (as amended by regulation 2 of the Forest Produce Import and Export Regulations 1989, Amendment No. 1), and substituting the Second Schedule set out in the Schedule to these regulations.

(2) The Forest Produce Import and Export Regulations 1989, Amendment No. 1 are hereby consequentially revoked.

COSTS OF INSPECTING FOREST PRODUCE AND DOCUMENT FEE FOR  
EXPORTING FOREST PRODUCE WITHOUT INSPECTION

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<b>1. Forest produce imported by sea</b> —The costs of inspecting forest produce imported by sea shall be—	
(a) For forest produce in sawn or round form, per cubic metre	5.04
(b) For inspections in relation to bulk cargo containers—	
(i) For each FCL . . . . .	9.63
(ii) For each LCL per revenue tonne or part thereof	3.33
(c) For inspections in relation to other cargo not charged, for each landed item, per revenue tonne or part thereof	0.36
<b>2. Forest produce exported</b> —The costs of inspecting forest produce to be exported from New Zealand shall be—	
(a) For forest produce to be inspected and approved and issued with a phytosanitary certificate,—	
(i) In round form, per cubic metre . . . . .	0.55
(ii) In sawn form, per cubic metre . . . . .	1.46
(iii) In sawn form, and inspected by special arrangement with the industry, per cubic metre . . . . .	0.73
(iv) Manufactured items, per consignment . . . . .	36.00
(b) For forest produce to be inspected and approved without the requirement of a phytosanitary certificate (in round or sawn form and including manufactured items), per consignment . . . . .	36.00
(c) For forest produce inspected and approved on a volume basis, per consignment . . . . .	36.00”

## EXPLANATORY NOTE

*This note is not part of the regulations, but is intended to indicate their general effect.*

These regulations, which come into force 28 days after the date of their notification in the *Gazette*, increase some of the inspection costs prescribed by the Forest Produce Import and Export Regulations 1989, and prescribe a new inspection cost and a document fee.

The costs for inspecting forest produce imported by sea are increased,—

(a) In the case of sawn or round form, from \$4.20 to \$5.04:

(b) In the case of bulk cargo containers, from \$8.50 to \$9.63 (per FCL) and from \$3 to \$3.33 (per LCL revenue tonne);

(c) In the case of other produce, from 25 cents to 36 cents per revenue tonne.

A new cost of 73 cents per cubic metre is prescribed for inspecting forest produce to be exported in sawn form, where the inspection is carried out by special arrangement with the industry.

A fee of \$36 per export consignment is prescribed for processing and approving documentation for forest produce exported without the requirement of a phytosanitary certificate.

A new definition of the term "LCL" is substituted in the principal regulations. The term now includes a container holding goods that are delivered to a freight forwarder for forwarding to 2 or more consignees.
