



**THE HOSPITAL EMPLOYMENT (SECRETARIAL AND  
CLERICAL OFFICERS) REGULATIONS 1952,  
AMENDMENT NO. 2**

ORDER IN COUNCIL

At the Government House at Wellington, this 14th day of July 1954

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to the Hospitals Act 1926, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following regulations.

**REGULATIONS**

1. (1) These regulations may be cited as the Hospital Employment (Secretarial and Clerical Officers) Regulations 1952, Amendment No. 2, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Hospital Employment (Secretarial and Clerical Officers) Regulations 1952\* (hereinafter referred to as the special regulations).

(2) Except as provided in regulation 3 of these regulations, these regulations shall be deemed to have come into force on the 1st day of April 1954.

2. Regulation 10 of the special regulations is hereby amended by omitting from subclause (2) the words "the next succeeding regulation", and substituting the words "these regulations".

3. (1) Regulation 11 of the special regulations (as amended by regulation 4 of the Hospital Employment (Secretarial and Clerical Officers) Regulations 1952, Amendment No. 1) is hereby further amended by omitting from the first proviso to subclause (1) the expression "£850", and substituting the expression "£912 12s."

(2) Regulation 4 of the Hospital Employment (Secretarial and Clerical Officers) Regulations 1952, Amendment No. 1, is hereby revoked.

(3) This regulation shall be deemed to have come into force on the 15th day of September 1953.

4. Regulation 12 of the special regulations is hereby amended by inserting, after subclause (3), the following new subclause:

“(3A) Where a whole time secretarial or clerical officer is required to be on call for seven days each week and is regularly required to work more than forty hours each week and is not entitled to payment in respect of overtime, a Board may, with the approval of the Director-General, grant annual leave, not exceeding seven days, additional to that to which the officer is entitled in accordance with subclause (1) of this regulation.”

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EXPLANATORY NOTE

[*This note is not part of the regulations, but is intended to indicate their general effect.*]

Regulation 2 makes it clear that meal hours do not count as hours of work for all the purposes of the special regulations.

Regulation 3 increases the maximum amount of salary plus overtime that an officer may earn in any year.

Regulation 4 provides for the granting of additional leave to officers who are on call for seven days each week and regularly work overtime but are not entitled to payment in respect of that overtime.
