**THE HOSPITAL EMPLOYMENT REGULATIONS 1957,
AMENDMENT NO. 2**

ORDER IN COUNCIL**

At the Government House at Wellington this 26th day of January 1960

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to the Hospitals Act 1957, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following regulations.

REGULATIONS

1. These regulations may be cited as the Hospital Employment Regulations 1957, Amendment No. 2, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Hospital Employment Regulations 1957* (hereinafter referred to as the principal regulations).

2. (1) In respect of any period commencing on or after the 1st day of October 1958, and in accordance with any general or special directions of the Minister of Health, a Board shall grant a general increase in the salaries or wages of employees under the principal regulations of an amount not exceeding in any case £20 a year.

(2) This regulation shall be deemed to have come into force on the 1st day of October 1958.

3. (1) In respect of any period commencing on or after the 12th day of October 1959, and in accordance with any general or special directions of the Minister of Health, a Board shall, in addition to the increase provided for in regulation 2 of these regulations, grant a general increase in the salaries or wages of employees under the principal regulations of an amount not exceeding in any case £40 a year.

(2) This regulation shall be deemed to have come into force on the 12th day of October 1959.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the regulations, but is intended to indicate their general effect.

These regulations make provision for general wage increases to employees of Hospital Boards from 1 October 1958 and 12 October 1959.
