## THE HOSPITAL EMPLOYMENT (X-RAY WORKERS) REGULATIONS 1953, AMENDMENT NO. 2

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to the Hospitals Act 1926, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following regulations.

## REGULATIONS

1. (1) These regulations may be cited as the Hospital Employment (X-ray Workers) Regulations 1953, Amendment No. 2, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Hospital Employment (X-ray Workers) Regulations 1953\* (hereinafter referred to as the special regulations).

(2) These regulations shall be deemed to have come into force on the 1st day of January 1955.

2. (1) Regulation 10 of the special regulations is hereby amended by adding to subclause (1) the following proviso:

"Provided that an allowance at the rate of 21s. per week shall be paid in respect of every week in excess of twenty-six weeks during which a radiographer is required to be on call in any year."

(2) The remuneration provided for by subclause (1) of this regulation shall be subject to the general wage increase prescribed by regulation 3 (2) of the Hospital Employment Regulations 1952, Amendment No. 1<sup>+</sup> (as amended by regulation 3 of the Hospital Employment Regulations 1952, Amendment No. 2<sup>+</sup>).

## EXPLANATORY NOTE

[This note is not part of the regulations, but is intended to indicate their general effect.]

These regulations prescribe a call duty allowance of 21s. a week (instead of the usual 10s. 6d. a week) where a radiographer employed by a Hospital Board is on call for more than 26 weeks in a year.
