ORDER IN COUNCIL

At the Government House at Wellington this 26th day of May 1980 Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL PURSUANT to section 3 (a) of the Health Act 1956, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following order.

ORDER

- 1. Title and commencement—(1) This order may be cited as the Infectious Diseases Order 1980.
- (2) This order shall come into force on the 14th day after the date of its notification in the Gazette.
- 2. Notifiable infectious diseases—The First Schedule to the Health Act 1956 (as substituted by section 2 (2) of the Health Amendment Act 1962) is hereby amended by inserting, in their appropriate alphabetical order in section B of Part I, the following items:

"Campylobacter infection.

"Legionellosis.

"Ross River fever".

EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the order, but is intended to indicate its general

This order includes the following diseases as notifiable diseases under the Health Act 1956—

(a) Infection due to the bacteria campylobacter that has recently been found to cause diseases, including diarrhoea, in humans:

(b) Legionnaires Disease:
(c) Ross River fever.
They are notifiable to the Medical Officer of Health.
