

THE JURORS FEES REGULATIONS 1954

At the Government House at Wellington this 22nd day of December 1954

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to the Payment of Jurors Act 1919, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following regulations.

REGULATIONS

- 1. (1) These regulations may be cited as the Jurors Fees Regulations 1954.
- (2) These regulations shall come into force on the 1st day of January 1955.
- 2. In these regulations, the term "juror" means a common juror or a special juror.
- 3. (1) The rates at which fees shall be paid to jurors for attendance at sittings of the Supreme Court, whether in civil or criminal cases, shall be as follows:
- (2) The Minister of Justice may authorize the sums payable under this regulation to be increased in any case where he considers that by reason of exceptional circumstances it is desirable to do so.

4. The expenses to be paid to jurors for travelling to and returning from any sittings of the Court shall be as follows:

(a) The actual cost of travelling by public conveyance:

- (b) Where no public conveyance is available, and the distance travelled exceeds two miles one way, mileage at the rate of 8d. a mile.
- 5. The Payment of Jurors Regulations 1948 are hereby revoked.*

EXPLANATORY NOTE

[This note is not part of the regulations, but is intended to indicate their general effect.]

These regulations are in substitution for the Payment of Jurors Regulations 1948. They prescribe increased scales of fees and expenses payable to jurors for attendance at the Supreme Court in civil and criminal cases.
