

## THE JURORS FEES REGULATIONS 1974

# DENIS BLUNDELL, Governor-General ORDER IN COUNCIL

At the Government Buildings at Wellington this 18th day of March 1974

### Present:

THE HON. H. WATT PRESIDING IN COUNCIL

Pursuant to the Payment of Jurors Act 1919, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following regulations.

#### REGULATIONS

1. Title and commencement—(1) These regulations may be cited as the Jurors Fees Regulations 1974.

(2) These regulations shall come into force on the 1st day of April 1974.

- 2. Interpretation—In these regulations, the term "juror" means a common juror or a special juror.
- 3. Jurors fees—(1) The rates at which fees shall be paid to jurors for attendance at sittings of the Supreme Court, whether in civil or criminal cases, shall be as follows:

(a) For every day on which attendance is required for a	
period not exceeding 3 hours	6.50
Provided that the fee prescribed by paragraph (b)	
of this regulation may be paid in any case where	
the Registrar is satisfied that the juror, because of his	
attendance at Court, will be absent from his work for	
a full day:	
(b) For every day on which attendance is required for a	
period exceeding 3 hours	13.00
Provided that where attendance is required after	_
6 o'clock in the afternoon, and the Judge has not	
o o clock in the arternoon, and the Judge has not	

directed that an evening meal be provided by the

Sheriff, the fee shall be .....

- (2) The Secretary for Justice may authorise the sums payable under this regulation to be increased in any case where he considers that by reason of exceptional circumstances it is desirable to do so.
- 4. Travelling expenses—The expenses to be paid to jurors for travelling to and returning from any sittings of the Court shall be as follows:

(a) The actual cost of travelling by public conveyance:

(b) In special circumstances, where the Registrar thinks fit, the

cost of travelling by taxi:

- (c) Where no public conveyance is available, and no allowance is made under paragraph (b) of this regulation, if the distance travelled exceeds 3 kilometres one way, an allowance at the rate of 8.5c a kilometre.
- 5. Revocation—The Jurors Fees Regulations 1969\* are hereby revoked.

#### EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the regulations, but is intended to indicate their general effect.

These regulations, which come into force on the 1st day of April 1974, are in substitution for the Jurors Fees Regulations 1969. They prescribe increased scales of fees and expenses payable to jurors for attendance at the Supreme Court in civil and criminal cases. The travelling allowance has been increased to 8.5c a kilometre which equals approximately 13.75c a mile.
