PURSUANT to section 19 (1A) of the Legal Aid Act 1969 (as inserted by section 8 (2) of the Legal Aid Amendment Act 1974), His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following order.

ORDER

1. Title—This order may be cited as the Legal Aid (Disposable Income) Order (No. 2) 1979.

2. Amounts to be deducted in determining disposable income—(1) The Schedule to the Legal Aid Act 1969 (as added by section 8 (5) of the Legal Aid Amendment Act 1974 and amended by the Legal Aid (Disposable Income) Order 1979) is hereby amended—

- (a) By omitting from clause (1) the expression “\$3,836”, and substituting the expression “\$4,010”;
- (b) By omitting from clause (2) the expression “\$1,690”, and substituting the expression “\$1,807”.

(2) The said Schedule is hereby further amended by revoking paragraphs (a) and (b) of clause (3), and substituting the following paragraphs:

- “(a) In the case of an unmarried person, of—
 - “(i) \$1,495 for the first child or dependent relative;
 - “(ii) \$208 for each additional child or dependent relative;
- “(b) In any other case, of \$208 for each child or dependent relative.”

3. Revocation—The Legal Aid (Disposable Income) Order 1978* and the Legal Aid (Disposable Income) Order 1979† are hereby consequentially revoked.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the order, but is intended to indicate its general effect.

This order increases the amounts to be deducted from the income of an applicant for legal aid in determining the applicant's disposable income for the purposes of the Legal Aid Act 1969.
