# THE LEAD PROCESS REGULATIONS 1950, AMENDMENT NO. 4

### HER EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to the Health Act 1956 and section 24 of the Health and Safety in Employment Act 1992, Her Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following regulations.

## REGULATIONS

1. Title and commencement—(1) These regulations may be cited as the Lead Process Regulations 1950, Amendment No. 4, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Lead Process Regulations 1950\* (hereinafter referred to as the principal regulations).

(2) These regulations shall come into force on the 28th day after the date of their notification in the *Gazette*.

2. Washing facilities—(1) Regulation 15 (1) of the principal regulations is hereby amended by omitting the words "section 62 of the Factories Act 1946", and substituting the words "the Building Regulations 1992".

(3) Regulation 15 of the principal regulations is hereby amended by revoking subclauses (2) and (3).
