**THE MILKING-MACHINE CONTROL ORDER 1942,
AMENDMENT NO. 2**

PURSUANT to the Primary Industries Emergency Regulations 1939,* I, James Gillispie Barclay, Minister of Agriculture, do hereby make the following Order.

O R D E R.

1. This Order may be cited as the Milking-machine Control Order 1942, Amendment No. 2.

2. This Order shall be read together with and form part of the Milking-machine Control Order 1942† (hereinafter called the principal Order).

3. This Order shall come into force on the day following notification hereof in the *Gazette*‡.

4. The principal Order is amended by adding thereto the following additional clauses :—

“ 6. No person being the occupier of a dairy shall purchase or contract to purchase or otherwise acquire any milking-machine rubberware of the respective descriptions set out in the first column of the Schedule contained in clause 7 hereof except for use in his dairy, and no person being the occupier of a dairy shall purchase or contract to purchase or otherwise acquire any milking-machine rubberware of the said respective descriptions if as a result of such purchase, contract, or other acquisition the aggregate quantity of milking-machine rubberware of the said respective descriptions in his possession and under his control and comprised in such purchase, contract, or other acquisition as aforesaid (exclusive of rubberware actually affixed to the milking-machine in his dairy) exceeds the respective quantities set out in the second column of the Schedule contained in clause 7 hereof.

“ 7. The following is the Schedule referred to in the last preceding clause hereof :—

“ SCHEDULE.

Item No.	First Column.	Second Column.
1	Air and milk dropper rubberware	Sufficient for one bail in the dairy.
2	Claw rubberware	One complete set for each set of teat-cups in use on the milking-machine.
3	Soft inflation rubberware ..	If moulded inflation rubberware be not used, one complete set for each set of teat-cups in use on the milking-machine.
4	Moulded inflation rubberware ..	If soft inflation rubberware be not used, one complete set for the teat-cups in one bail of the milking-machine.

“ 8. Except as provided in clause 9 hereof, no person shall sell any milking-machine rubberware of any of the descriptions referred to in the first column of the Schedule contained in clause 7 hereof unless at the time of sale the purchaser delivers to the vendor an order in writing signed by the purchaser setting out the quantity and description of the rubberware sought to be acquired and satisfies the vendor that the purchase of the rubberware mentioned in the purchaser's order is permitted by clause 6 hereof.

“ 9. Nothing contained in clause 8 hereof shall be deemed to forbid any person carrying on the business of a wholesale or retail dealer in milking-machine rubberware from selling or contracting to sell or otherwise disposing of milking-machine rubberware to any other person carrying on the aforesaid business.

“ 10. Every person who sells for use in a dairy any milking-machine rubberware of any of the descriptions referred to in the first column of the Schedule contained in clause 7 hereof shall keep for a period of twelve months after the date of sale all orders for the purchase of such rubberware received by him pursuant to clause 8 hereof and such other records as will enable him to prove any sale of such rubberware, and such records shall be open to inspection at reasonable hours by an Inspector under the said Act or by any person authorized in that behalf by the Minister.”
