ORDER IN COUNCIL

At the Government House at Wellington this 7th day of July 1965

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE ADMINISTRATOR OF THE GOVERNMENT IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to section 5 of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade Act 1948, as amended by section 11 (3) of the Customs Acts Amendment Act 1961, His Excellency the Administrator of the Government, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following order.

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ORDER

1. This order may be cited as the Most Favoured Nation Tariff Order 1964, Amendment No. 1, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Most Favoured Nation Tariff Order 1964* (hereinafter referred to as the principal order).

2. The First Schedule to the principal order is hereby amended by inserting, after the reference to Peru, the words "Polish People's Republic".

3. Subject to the provisions of the Cook Islands Customs Duties Order 1962† (as from time to time modified, whether before or after the commencement of this order), this order shall be in force in the Cook Islands.

4. The provisions of this order shall be subject to the provisions of section 143 of the Customs Act 1913.

5. All duties of Customs that have become due and payable and all penalties and forfeitures that have been incurred before the commencement of this order shall be recovered and enforced as if this order had not been made.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the order, but is intended to indicate its general effect.

This order applies the Most Favoured Nation Tariff to goods imported into New Zealand from the Polish People's Republic, and extends this treatment to such goods imported into the Cook Islands.
