



**THE MAORI HOUSING REGULATIONS 1936,  
AMENDMENT NO. 1**

**ORDER IN COUNCIL**

At the Government House at Wellington this 29th day of September  
1954

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to the Maori Housing Act 1935, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following regulations.

**REGULATIONS**

1. These regulations may be cited as the Maori Housing Regulations 1936, Amendment No. 1, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Maori Housing Regulations 1936\* (hereinafter referred to as the principal regulations).

2. These regulations shall come into force on the 1st day of October 1954.

3. (1) Regulation 3 of the principal regulations is hereby amended by revoking subclause (6), and substituting the following subclause:

“(6) The costs of all instruments of security and other documents shall, unless the Board otherwise directs, be deducted from the advance and shall, until paid, be charged on the whole of the property comprised in the securities, and shall be in accordance with the scale of charges approved by the Council of the New Zealand Law Society reduced by one-third:

“Provided that the Board may, in its discretion, in any case where it considers it reasonable and equitable to do so, reduce or remit the amount payable under this subclause.”

(2) The principal regulations are hereby amended by revoking the Third Schedule.
