**THE MOTOR-VEHICLES INSURANCE (THIRD-PARTY RISKS)
REGULATIONS 1960, AMENDMENT NO. 1**

ORDER IN COUNCIL

At the Government Buildings at Wellington this 17th day of April 1961

Present:

THE RIGHT HON. KEITH HOLYOAKE, PRESIDING IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to the Transport Act 1949, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following regulations.

REGULATIONS

1. (1) These regulations may be cited as the Motor-Vehicles Insurance (Third-Party Risks) Regulations 1960, Amendment No. 1, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Motor-Vehicles Insurance (Third-Party Risks) Regulations 1960* (hereinafter referred to as the principal regulations).

(2) These regulations shall come into force on the 1st day of July 1961.

2. Regulation 5 of the principal regulations is hereby amended by omitting from subclause (1) the words "1st day of July 1960", and substituting the words "1st day of July 1961".

3. The principal regulations are hereby amended by revoking the First Schedule, and substituting the following Schedule:
