PURSUANT to section 105 of the Medicines Act 1981, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council and on the advice of the Minister of Health tendered after consultation with the organisations and bodies that appeared to the Minister to be representative of persons likely to be substantially affected, hereby makes the following regulations.

REGULATIONS

1. Title and commencement—(1) These regulations may be cited as the Medicines Regulations 1984, Amendment No. 7, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Medicines Regulations 1984* (hereinafter referred to as the principal regulations).

(2) These regulations shall come into force on the 28th day after the date of their notification in the *Gazette*.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the regulations, but is intended to indicate their general effect.

These regulations, which come into force on the 28th day after the date of their notification in the *Gazette*, amend the Medicines Regulations 1984.

Regulation 2 substitutes new lists of prescription medicines, restricted medicines, and pharmacy-only medicines.
