



**THE NOXIOUS SUBSTANCES REGULATIONS 1954,
AMENDMENT NO. 1**

ORDER IN COUNCIL

At the Government House at Wellington this 21st day of December 1981

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to—

- (a) The Health Act 1956 in relation to regulation 1; and
- (b) The Factories and Commercial Premises Act 1981 in relation to regulations 1 and 2,—

His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following regulations.

REGULATIONS

1. Title and commencement—(1) These regulations may be cited as the Noxious Substances Regulations 1954, Amendment No. 1, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Noxious Substances Regulations 1954* (hereinafter referred to as the principal regulations).

(2) These regulations shall come into force on the 1st day of February 1982.

2. Offences—The principal regulations are hereby amended by revoking regulation 21, and substituting the following regulation:

“21. Every person commits an offence against these regulations, and shall be liable on summary conviction to the penalties provided in that behalf in section 62 (1) (b) of the Factories and Commercial Premises Act

1981, who contravenes or fails to comply in any respect with any provision contained in this Part of these regulations or with any condition or requirement imposed under any such provision.”

EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the regulations, but is intended to indicate their general effect.

These regulations, which come into force on 1 February 1982 (the commencement of the Factories and Commercial Premises Act 1981), amend the offence provisions of the Noxious Substances Regulations 1954 so as to omit all references to the amount of penalties. The effect is that the penalties will be those provided in that Act.
