ORDER IN COUNCIL

At Wellington this 10th day of April 1989

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to section 4 (1) of the Time Act 1974, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following order.

ORDER

- 1. Title and commencement—(1) This order may be cited as the New Zealand Daylight Time Order 1989.
- (2) This order shall come into force on the 28th day after the date of its notification in the *Gazette*.
- 2. New Zealand daylight time—It is hereby declared that for the period commencing at 2 a.m. New Zealand standard time on Sunday, 8 October 1989, and ceasing at 2 a.m. New Zealand standard time on Sunday, 18 March 1990—
 - (a) The time for general purposes in New Zealand, except for the Chatham Islands, shall be 1 hour in advance of New Zealand standard time; and
 - (b) The time for general purposes in the Chatham Islands shall be 1 hour and 45 minutes in advance of New Zealand standard time.

3. Revocation—The New Zealand Daylight Time Order 1975* is hereby revoked.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the order, but is intended to indicate its general effect.

This order declares that New Zealand daylight time is to be observed from 2 a.m. New Zealand standard time on Sunday, 8 October 1989 until 2 a.m. New Zealand standard time on Sunday, 18 March 1990.
