**THE NEW ZEALAND GROWN FRUIT REGULATIONS 1952,
AMENDMENT NO. 2**

ORDER IN COUNCIL

At the Government Buildings at Wellington this 10th day of April 1957

Present:

THE RIGHT HON. S. G. HOLLAND PRESIDING IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to the Orchard and Garden Diseases Act 1928, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following regulations.

REGULATIONS

1. These regulations may be cited as the New Zealand Grown Fruit Regulations 1952, Amendment No. 2, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the New Zealand Grown Fruit Regulations 1952* (hereinafter referred to as the principal regulations).

2. Regulation 4 of the principal regulations is hereby amended as follows:

- (a) By inserting, after the definition of the term "Approved", the following definition: "Board" means the New Zealand Apple and Pear Marketing Board established under the Apple and Pear Marketing Act 1948:
- (b) By inserting, after the definition of the term "Minimum size", the following definition: "Minister" means the Minister of Agriculture.

3. The principal regulations are hereby amended by inserting, after regulation 5, the following regulation:

"5A. Notwithstanding the provisions of regulation 5 of these regulations, it shall be lawful for any person, with the prior approval of the Director, to sell fruit in a container other than of a type which conforms to one of the types prescribed by this part of these regulations for that kind of fruit."

4. Regulation 6 of the principal regulations is hereby amended by adding the following paragraphs:

- “(e) Is sold by a producer to the Board and is not packed; or
- “(f) Is sold by the Board and is not packed.”

5. Regulation 27 of the principal regulations is hereby amended by adding the following proviso:

“Provided that nothing in this regulation shall apply to any fruit sold by or on behalf of the Board in other than standard packages.”

6. Regulation 28 of the principal regulations is hereby amended by omitting the words “to which paragraphs (a), (b), or (c) of regulation 6”, and substituting the words “to which paragraphs (a), (b), (c), (e), or (f) of regulation 6”.

7. The principal regulations are hereby amended by revoking regulation 45, and substituting the following regulation:

“45. Apples in any package shall be reasonably of the same degree of maturity.”

8. The principal regulations are hereby amended by revoking regulation 46, and substituting the following regulation:

“46. (1) Apples of the varieties referred to in the Second Schedule hereto shall carry for the appropriate grades not less than the percentage or other description of colour set opposite the name of the variety of apples referred to in that Schedule.

“(2) The maximum and minimum sizes (by count) of varieties of apples to which standard grades, either for export or for sale within New Zealand, apply, shall be determined from time to time by the Board with the approval of the Minister.”

9. Subclause (2) of regulation 48 of the principal regulations is hereby amended as follows:

(a) By omitting from the table for Apples: Domestic Grade the words “Cracks: Dry, not exceeding $\frac{1}{2}$ in. in length”, and substituting the words “Cracks: Dry, not exceeding $1\frac{1}{2}$ in. in length”:

(b) By omitting from the table for Apples: Domestic Grade the words “Scars: Shallow, not exceeding 1 in. on apples of the Dunn’s variety”, and substituting the words “Scars: Shallow, not exceeding $1\frac{1}{2}$ in.”.

10. The principal regulations are hereby amended by revoking regulation 50, and substituting the following regulation:

“50. Pears in any package shall be reasonably of the same degree of maturity.”

11. The principal regulations are hereby amended by revoking regulation 51, and substituting the following regulation:

“51. The maximum and minimum sizes (by count) of varieties of pears to which standard grades, either for export or for sale within New Zealand, apply, shall be determined from time to time by the Board with the approval of the Minister.”

12. Regulation 52 of the principal regulations is hereby amended by omitting the words “pears of one variety” and substituting the words “pears of good characteristic appearance (reasonably good appearance for Commercial and Domestic grades) of one variety”.

13. The principal regulations are hereby amended by revoking regulation 55 (as substituted by the New Zealand Grown Fruit Regulations 1952, Amendment No. 1), and substituting the following regulation:

“55. No lemons smaller in size than $1\frac{5}{8}$ inches in diameter shall be included in either of the standard packages numbered 1 or 2 in the First Schedule hereto.”

14. Regulation 89 of the principal regulations is hereby amended by adding the following words:

“If the fruit is not completely covered by the wrapping paper used it shall be doubly wrapped.”

15. (1) The principal regulations are hereby amended by revoking the First Schedule (as substituted by regulation 28 of the New Zealand Grown Fruit Regulations 1952, Amendment No. 1), and substituting the First Schedule set out in the First Schedule to these regulations.

(2) Regulation 28 of the New Zealand Grown Fruit Regulations 1952, Amendment No. 1, is hereby revoked.

16. The principal regulations are hereby amended by revoking the Second Schedule, and substituting the Second Schedule set out in the Second Schedule to these regulations.

17. The principal regulations are hereby amended by revoking the Third Schedule, and substituting the Third Schedule set out in the Third Schedule to these regulations.

Every package must be so constructed that the opening for the purpose of packing fruit therein shall be on its greatest width (regulation 9).

No. 1 package may be used for lemons only if the lemons are jumble packed.

No. 2 package when used for lemons shall have $\frac{3}{16}$ in. bottoms with cleats.”

NOTE—(a) The abbreviations of grades in this Schedule are the following: XF, Extra Fancy Grade; F, Fancy Grade; Com., Commercial Grade; Dom., Domestic Grade.

(b) The figures in the column headed 'Minimum Colour' indicate the respective minimum percentage of the surface of each separate fruit which is required to display the full characteristic red colour of the variety.

(c) The abbreviations of colour in this Schedule are the following: CS, colour showing; NC, no colour.

(d) 'Colour showing' means quite noticeable streaks of colour.

(e) An apple having solid red or striped colour of lighter shade than the full characteristic red colour of the variety may be admitted to any respective grade so long as it has a sufficient area of colouring to give it as good an appearance as one which displays the full characteristic red colour of the variety over the minimum percentage of surface prescribed by this Schedule for that grade.

(f) Faded brown stripes shall not be considered as colour. For yellow and green varieties a natural blush is not objected to.

(g) Allowances for blemish, russet, black spot, and other defects are provided for in regulation 48.

(h) (C) denotes culinary apples."

EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the regulations, but is intended to indicate their general effect.

The regulations make miscellaneous amendments to the New Zealand Grown Fruit Regulations 1952. They permit the sale of fruit, with the approval of the Director of the Horticulture Division, in other than standard packages. They also permit growers to deliver fruit loose to the N.Z. Apple and Pear Marketing Board and the Board to sell fruit in any type of package. They authorise the Board, with the approval of the Minister of Agriculture, to determine the count of fruit for export and local sales and require double wrapping of fruit where a single wrapping does not cover the fruit. They also allow lemons to be packed in standard package No. 1 provided they are jumble packed.
