## THE NEW ZEALAND GROWN FRUIT REGULATIONS 1952, AMENDMENT NO. 7

## ARTHUR PORRITT, Governor-General ORDER IN COUNCIL

At the Government Buildings at Wellington this 5th day of February 1968

PURSUANT to the Orchard and Garden Diseases Act 1928, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following regulations.

### REGULATIONS

1. (1) These regulations may be cited as the New Zealand Grown Fruit Regulations 1952, Amendment No. 7, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the New Zealand Grown Fruit Regulations 1952\* (hereinafter referred to as the principal regulations).

(2) These regulations shall come into force on the day after the date of their notification in the *Gazette*.

2. Subclause (2) of regulation 48 of the principal regulations (as amended by regulation 11 of the New Zealand Grown Fruit Regulations 1952, Amendment No. 3, and by regulation 4 of the New Zealand Grown Fruit Regulations 1952, Amendment No. 4, and by regulation 5 of the New Zealand Grown Fruit Regulations 1952, Amendment No. 5 and by regulation 5 of the New Zealand Grown Fruit Regulations, Amendment No. 6), is hereby further amended as follows:

(a) By adding as paragraphs (d) and (e) of the table for Apples: Extra Fancy and Fancy Grade the following paragraphs:

NOTE—(a) The abbreviations of grades in this Schedule are the following: XF, Extra Fancy Grade; F, Fancy Grade; Com., Commercial Grade; Dom., Domestic Grade.

(b) The figures in the column headed 'Minimum Colour' indicate the respective minimum percentage of the surface of each separate fruit which is required to display the full characteristic red colour of the variety.

(c) The abbreviations of colour in this Schedule are the following: CS, colour showing; NC, no colour.

(d) 'Colour showing' means quite noticeable streaks of colour.

(e) An apple having solid red or striped colour of less bright shade than the full characteristic red colour of the variety may be admitted to any respective grade so long as it has a sufficient area of such colouring to give it as good an appearance as one which displays the full characteristic red colour of the variety over the minimum percentage of surface prescribed by this Schedule for that grade.

(f) Dull brownish stripes or patches shall not be considered as characteristic colour. For yellow and green varieties a natural blush is allowable.

(g) Allowances for blemish, russet, black spot, and other defects are provided for in regulation 48.

(h) (C) denotes culinary apples."

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### EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the regulations, but is intended to indicate their general effect.

These regulations require improvements in the appearance of certain grades of apples,

nese regulations require improvements in the appearance of certain grades of apples, particularly apples for export. Regulation 2 specifies the maximum amount of natural and cracked russet allowable on Extra Fancy, Fancy, and Good grades of apples. Regulation 3 establishes a new schedule of colour standards for apples based on the

schedule in the principal regulations as amended a number of times; the additional changes now included generally increase the area of colour needed on Fancy Grade apples acceptable for export. Regulation 4 sets out consequential revocations.
