THE OTAGO AND SOUTHLAND TANNING INDUSTRY LABOUR LEGISLATION SUSPENSION ORDER 1940.

Whereas it appears to me to be expedient for maintaining supplies and services essential to the life of the community, I, Patrick Charles Webb, Minister of Labour, pursuant to the Labour Legislation Emergency Regulations 1940,* do hereby order as follows:—

- 1. This Order may be cited as the Otago and Southland Tanning Industry Labour Legislation Suspension Order 1940.
- 2. This Order applies to all workers in the tanning industry in the Otago and Southland Industrial District coming within the scope of the Northern, Canterbury, and Otago and Southland Tanners' award, dated the 5th day of September, 1939, and recorded in Book of Awards, Vol. XXXIX, p. 1281, and to the employers of such workers.
- 3. The provisions of all Acts and all regulations thereunder and of the Northern, Canterbury, and Otago and Southland Tanners' award, dated the 5th day of September, 1939, affecting conditions of employment shall be and are hereby suspended in so far as they operate to prevent an additional four hours being worked in the tanning industry in the Otago and Southland Industrial District at ordinary rates of pay, but such suspension shall be subject to the conditions hereinafter set forth.
- 4. The additional four hours hereinbefore referred to shall be worked on five or five and a half days of the week, as may be decided upon by agreement between the industrial union of workers concerned and the employer.
- 5. Youths employed during such additional four hours shall be paid for the time worked at ordinary rates in addition to their weekly wage.
- 6. This Order shall come into effect on and from the date of notification hereof in the Gazette.
