ORDER IN COUNCIL

At Wellington this 19th day of May 1986

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL.

PURSUANT to section 57 of the Pharmacy Act 1970, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following regulations.

REGULATIONS

- 1. Title and commencement—(1) These regulations may be cited as the Pharmacy Registration Regulations 1972, Amendment No. 4, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Pharmacy Registration Regulations 1972* (hereinafter referred to as the principal regulations).
 - (2) These regulations shall come into force on the 1st day of June 1986.
- 2. Pharmacy registration fees—Regulation 7 of the principal regulations (as amended by regulation 2 (1) of the Pharmacy Registration Regulations 1972, Amendment No. 3) is hereby amended by omitting the expression "\$75" in both places where it occurs, and substituting in each case the expression "\$150".

- 3. Penalties for offences—Regulation 15 of the principal regulations is hereby amended by omitting the expression "\$20", and substituting the expression "\$150".
- 4. Revocation—The Pharmacy Registration Regulations 1972, Amendment No. 3 are hereby revoked.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the regulations, but is intended to indicate their general effect.

These regulations, which come into force on 1 June 1986,-

- (a) Increase from \$75 to \$150 the annual registration fee for a pharmacy; and
- (b) Increase from \$20 to \$150 the maximum fine that may be imposed for an offence against the principal regulations.
