



THE RADIO AMENDMENT REGULATIONS 1938.

GALWAY, Governor-General.
ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House at Wellington, this 23rd day of
September, 1938.

Present :

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL.

PURSUANT to the Post and Telegraph Act, 1928, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, doth hereby make the following regulations.

REGULATIONS.

1. These regulations may be cited as the Radio Amendment Regulations 1938.

2. These regulations shall be read together with and form part of the Radio Regulations 1932* (hereinafter called the principal regulations).

3. Regulation 25 (1) of the principal regulations is revoked, and the following substituted :—

“ 25. (1) Any license or certificate issued or enuring under these regulations may at any time be suspended, revoked, or withdrawn by the Minister at his discretion in case of misconduct or breach on the part of the holder of the International Telecommunication Convention, or of these regulations, or of any conditions, directions, or rules prescribed by the Minister for the guidance of operators or for the working of the licensed station, or of any conditions, directions, or rules subject to which the license or certificate was issued, or upon the grounds that an emergency has arisen in which it is expedient in the public interest that His Majesty's Government shall have control over the transmission or reception of wireless signals. The licensee shall not be entitled to compensation for any suspension, revocation, or withdrawal of a license or certificate under this regulation.”

4. Regulation 63 of the principal regulations is revoked, and the following substituted :—

“ 63. It shall be a condition of every receiving-station license, whether expressly set out therein or not, that the holder thereof shall not, without the written consent of the Minister, commit to writing for the purpose of publication in a newspaper, or cause or enable or assist any other person to commit to writing for that purpose, any matter transmitted from any radio station either in New Zealand or overseas.”
