

THE RABBIT BOARD POSTAL-VOTING REGULATIONS 1929, AMENDMENT NO. 1.

At the Government Buildings at Wellington, this 22nd day of April, 1941.

THE HON. W. NASH PRESIDING IN COUNCIL.

PURSUANT to the Rabbit Nuisance Act, 1928, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, doth hereby make the following regulations.

REGULATIONS.

1. These regulations may be cited as the Rabbit Board Postalvoting Regulations 1929, Amendment No. 1.

2. These regulations shall be read together with and form part of the Rabbit Board Postal-voting Regulations 1929* (hereinafter called the principal regulations).

 $\hat{\mathbf{3}}$. These regulations shall come into force on the day following notification in the *Gazette* of the making thereof.

4. The form in the Schedule to the principal regulations is deleted, and the following form is substituted :---
