



## THE RADIO REGULATIONS 1953, AMENDMENT NO. 2

### ORDER IN COUNCIL

At the Government Buildings at Wellington this 9th day of November 1954

Present:

THE HON. C. M. BOWDEN PRESIDING IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to the Post and Telegraph Act 1928, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following regulations.

### REGULATIONS

1. These regulations may be cited as the Radio Regulations 1953, Amendment No. 2, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Radio Regulations 1953\* (hereinafter referred to as the principal regulations.)

2. The principal regulations are hereby amended by revoking regulation 175, and substituting the following regulation:

“175. All communications from amateur stations, whether by speech or in the Morse code, shall be conducted in plain language and shall be limited to messages relating to radio experiments and to remarks of a personal character for which, by reason of their unimportance, recourse would not normally be had to the general telecommunication system.”

### EXPLANATORY NOTE

*[This note is not part of the regulations, but is intended to indicate their general effect.]*

These regulations permit the use of any language for communications from amateur radio stations. Hitherto only English and Maori were permitted to be used.

Issued under the authority of the Regulations Act 1936.

Date of notification in *Gazette*: 11 November 1954.
