



THE RADIO REGULATIONS 1970, AMENDMENT NO. 12

ORDER IN COUNCIL

At the Government House at Wellington this 3rd day of May 1982

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to the Post Office Act 1959, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following regulations.

REGULATIONS

1. Title and commencement—(1) These regulations may be cited as the Radio Regulations 1970, Amendment No. 12, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Radio Regulations 1970* (hereinafter referred to as the principal regulations).

(2) These regulations shall come into force on the 14th day after the date of their notification in the *Gazette*.

2. Ship stations operating in bands between 1605 kHz and 2850 kHz with class A 3 emissions—The principal regulations are hereby amended by inserting, after regulation 100, the following regulation:

“100A. All ship station licences authorising the licensee to use a radio telephone installation capable of transmitting A 3 emissions in the authorised bands between 1605 kHz and 2850 kHz—

“(a) Shall be deemed to be a licence authorising operation on the frequency of 2182 kHz only; and

“(b) Shall expire on the 1st day of January 1983.”

EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the regulations, but is intended to indicate their general effect.

These regulations provide that all ship stations using double sideband emissions are to be restricted to the distress frequency of 2182 kHz only, and their licences are to expire on 1 January 1983.
