THE SIREX ADVISORY COMMITTEE REGULATIONS 1950, AMENDMENT NO. 1

At the Government Buildings at Wellington, this 25th day of February 1952

Pursuant to section 72 of the Forests Act 1949, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following regulations.

REGULATIONS

- 1. These regulations may be cited as the Sirex Advisory Committee Regulations 1950, Amendment No. 1, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Sirex Advisory Committee Regulations 1950* (hereinafter referred to as the principal regulations).
- 2. These regulations shall come into force on the day after the date of their notification in the *Gazette*.
- 3. Regulation 5 of the principal regulations is hereby amended by revoking paragraph (a) of subclause (1), and substituting the following paragraph:—
 - "(a) The Silviculturist (Management Division), New Zealand
 Forest Service, who shall be the Chairman of the
 Committee:".
- 4. Regulation 6 of the principal regulations is hereby amended by omitting the words "one year", and substituting the words "two years".

EXPLANATORY NOTE

[This note is not part of the regulations, but is intended to indicate their general effect.]

These regulations provide for the Silviculturist (Management Division) New Zealand Forest Service to take the place of the Inspector in Charge of that Division as the Chairman of the Sirex Advisory Committee. This will cause the original Chairman of the Committee to continue in office. Members appointed to the Committee are in future to hold office for two years instead of one year as previously.
