THE SHIPPING AND SEAMEN AMENDMENT ACT **COMMENCEMENT ORDER 1961**

PURSUANT to sections 6 (4) and 7 (7) of the Shipping and Seamen Amendment Act 1959, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following order.

ORDER

1. This order may be cited as the Shipping and Seamen Amendment Act Commencement Order 1961.

2. The following provisions of the Shipping and Seamen Amendment Act 1959 shall come into force on the 1st day of May 1961, namely:

(a) Subsections (2) and (3) of section 6, except in respect of the following kinds of ships:

(i) Restricted-limit motor ships (not being fishing boats) 50 ft or more register length and of less than 200 brake horsepower:

(ii) Home-trade fishing boats (being motor ships) exceeding 60 ft register length and of less than 200 brake horsepower:

(b) Section 7, except to the extent that it repeals paragraph (i) of subsection (1) of section 19 of the Shipping and Seamen Act 1952 (which relates to the certificate as master of river ship).

EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the order, but is intended to indicate its general effect.

The effect of this order is that the new manning scale set out in the Schedule to the Shipping and Seamen Amendment Act 1959 will come into force on 1 May 1961, except in respect of certain kinds of restricted-limit ships and fishing boats which are excluded by clause 2 (a) (i) and (ii) of the order. The old manning scale in respect of such ships will continue in force in the meantime. The order also brings into force section 7 of the 1959 Amendment Act, with the exception mentioned in clause 2 (b).
