Pursuant to the Shipping and Seamen Act 1952, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following order.

#### ORDER

1. Title and commencement—(1) This order may be cited as the Shipping (Load Line Convention Countries) Order 1970.

(2) This order shall come into force on the 5th day of May 1970.

2. Convention countries—It is hereby declared that the Governments of the countries specified in the Schedule to this order have accepted or acceded to the International Convention on Load Lines 1966.
