**THE SOCIAL SECURITY (PHYSIOTHERAPY BENEFITS)
REGULATIONS 1951, AMENDMENT NO. 3**

THE RIGHT HON. S. G. HOLLAND PRESIDING IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to the Social Security Act 1938, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following regulations.

REGULATIONS

1. (1) These regulations may be cited as the Social Security (Physiotherapy Benefits) Regulations 1951, Amendment No. 3, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Social Security (Physiotherapy Benefits) Regulations 1951* (hereinafter referred to as the principal regulations).

(2) These regulations shall come into force on the day after the date of their notification in the *Gazette*.

2. Regulation 9 of the principal regulations is hereby amended by revoking subclause (2), and substituting the following subclause:

“(2) The right to claim payment of a fee in accordance with this regulation in respect of any treatment shall be subject to the condition that the contractor has not claimed and will not claim from the patient or any other person in respect of the same treatment a fee—

“(a) Exceeding 8s. if the treatment is given in premises occupied by the contractor; or

“(b) Exceeding 13s. if the treatment is given elsewhere.”

EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the regulations, but is intended to indicate their general effect.

The effect of the amendment made by these regulations is that the maximum fee that may be charged to a patient by a contracting physiotherapist (in addition to the amount he may claim from the Social Security Fund) is increased by 1s. 6d. for each treatment. The increase does not apply to group treatments.
