

# THE SOCIAL SECURITY (HOSPITAL INPATIENT TREATMENT) FEES REGULATIONS 1991, AMENDMENT NO. 2

#### ORDER IN COUNCIL

HER EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to section 123 of the Social Security Act 1964, Her Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following regulations.

# REGULATIONS

- 1. Title and commencement—(1) These regulations may be cited as the Social Security (Hospital Inpatient Treatment) Fees Regulations 1991, Amendment No. 2, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Social Security (Hospital Inpatient Treatment) Fees Regulations 1991\* (hereinafter referred to as the principal regulations).
- (2) These regulations shall come into force on the 1st day of September 1992, and shall apply in respect of prescribed hospital treatment provided on or after that date.
- **2.** Interpretation—Regulation 2 of the principal regulations is hereby amended—

- (a) By omitting from the definition of the term "hospital inpatient type A" the words "who has not attained the age of 60 years before the 1st day of April 1992 and":
- (b) By omitting from the definition of the term "hospital inpatient type B" the words "who has not attained the age of 60 years before the 1st day of April 1992 and".

#### EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the regulations, but is intended to indicate their general effect.

These regulations, which come into force on 1 September 1992, provide for the charging by area health boards for prescribed hospital treatment provided for persons who have attained the age of 60 years. At present, persons who attained the age of 60 years before 1 April 1992 are exempted from paying such charges.
