THE STATE SERVICES SALARY ORDER 1980

ORDER IN COUNCIL

At the Government Buildings at Wellington this 14th day of April 1980

Present:

THE RIGHT HON. R. D. MULDOON PRESIDING IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to the State Services Conditions of Employment Act 1977, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following order.

ORDER

1. Title and commencement—(1) This order may be cited as the State Services Salary Order 1980.

(2) This order shall be deemed to have come into force on the 10th day of November 1979.

2. Maximum salary that an employing authority may prescribe—For the purposes of section 20 (1) of the State Services Conditions of Employment Act 1977, the maximum salary that any employing authority may by determination prescribe shall be \$29,035 a year.

3. Maximum salary that the Public Sector Tribunal may prescribe—For the purposes of section 43 (4) of the State Services Conditions of Employment Act 1977, the maximum salary that the Public Sector Tribunal may by order prescribe shall be \$29,035 a year.

4. Maximum salary that a Single Service Tribunal may prescribe—For the purposes of section 56 (4) of the State Services Conditions of Employment Act 1977, the maximum salary that a Single Service Tribunal may by order prescribe shall be \$29,035 a year.

5. Revocation—The State Services Salary Order (No. 2) 1979* is hereby revoked.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the order, but is intended to indicate its general effect.

This order, which is deemed to have come into force on 10 November 1979, increases by 10.4 percent the maximum salary that may be prescribed under the State Services Conditions of Employment Act 1977 by an employing authority or the Public Sector Tribunal or a Single Service Tribunal.
