HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to the Education Act 1964, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following regulations.

REGULATIONS

1. Title and commencement—(1) These regulations may be cited as the Tertiary Assistance Grants Regulations 1982, Amendment No. 5, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Tertiary Assistance Grants Regulations 1982* (hereinafter referred to as the principal regulations).

(2) These regulations shall come into force on the 1st day of January 1987.

2. Interpretation—Regulation 2 of the principal regulations is hereby amended by inserting in the definition of the term "tertiary institution",

after the words "or teachers college,", the words "or an institution (being an institution offering tertiary education) approved by the Director-General for the purposes of this regulation;".

3. Eligibility for award of study grants in respect of university study—Regulation 7 (1) of the principal regulations is hereby amended by revoking paragraph (a), and substituting the following paragraphs:

- "(aa) He is academically qualified for entrance to a university by virtue of his compliance with requirements prescribed under section 41 (1) (d) of the Universities Act 1961; or
- "(ab) He has been granted admission to a university ad eundem at University Entrance standard; or".

EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the regulations, but is intended to indicate their general effect.

These regulations, which come into force on 1 January 1987, amend the Tertiary Assistance Grants Regulations 1982 in 2 respects. First, they enable grants to be paid to students enrolled at certain specialist educational institutions, to be approved by the Director-General of Education for the purpose, not previously included in the definition of the term "tertiary institution" in those regulations. Secondly they make eligible for the award of a study grant any person who is granted admission to a university otherwise than simply by attaining the age of 21 years.
