ORDER IN COUNCIL

At the Government House at Wellington, this 21st day of
July, 1948

Present :

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to section 5 of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade Act, 1948, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, doth hereby order as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Trade Arrangement (Switzerland) Order 1948.
2. The duties provided for by the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade Act, 1948, in accordance with Part I of Schedule XIII to the general agreement or with the Second Schedule to that Act are hereby applied to similar goods, of the classes set out in the Schedule hereto, being the produce or manufacture of Switzerland.
3. The provisions of this Order shall be subject to the provisions of section 143 of the Customs Act, 1913.
4. This Order shall come into force on the 26th day of July, 1948.
