

THE TRADE ARRANGEMENT (ISRAEL) ORDER 1959

COBHAM, Governor-General ORDER IN COUNCIL

At the Government Buildings at Wellington this 11th day of February 1959

Pursuant to section 5 of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade Act 1948, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following order.

ORDER

- 1. (1) This order may be cited as the Trade Arrangement (Israel) Order 1959.
- (2) This order shall have effect on and from the date on which the Trade Arrangement of the 13th day of January 1959 between the Governments of Israel and New Zealand comes into effect.
- 2. The duties and exemptions from duty provided for in accordance with Part I of Schedule XIII to the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade, as set out in the First Schedule to the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade Act 1948, and as from time to time modified (whether before or after the commencement of this order), and the duties and exemptions from duty provided for in accordance with the Second Schedule to that Act, as from time to time modified as aforesaid, are hereby applied to goods being the produce or manufacture of Israel.
 - 3. This order shall not apply in the Cook Islands.
- 4. The provisions of this order shall be subject to the provisions of section 143 of the Customs Act 1913.
- 5. All duties of Customs that have become due and payable and all penalties and forfeitures that have been incurred before the commencement of this order shall be recovered and enforced as if this order had not been made.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the order, but is intended to indicate its general effect. This order extends most-favoured-nation Tariff treatment to Israel.
