And whereas I, William Ferguson Massey, Labour, am satisfied that all the occupiers of the chemists' shops in the Borough of Wanganui affected by section 3 of the Shops and Offices Amendment Act, 1915, have been

afforded an equal right to share in the profits of the business carried on by such specified shop:

Now, therefore, in pursuance of section 25 of the Shops and Offices Act, 1908, and of section 3 of the Shops and Offices Amendment Act, 1915, I do hereby direct that on and after the 10th day of July, 1916, all chemists' shops in the Borough of Wanganui except such specified shop shall be closed as follows: On Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Fridays, at 6 p.m.; on Saturdays at 9.30 p.m.; and that such specified shop shall be entitled to remain open after the above-mentioned closing-hours for the purpose only of the sale of medicines and surgical appliances that are urgently needed.
