At the Government Buildings at Wellington, this fifteenth day of December, 1919.

THE HONOURABLE SIR WILLIAM FRASER PRESIDING IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by Order in Council dated the seventh day of February, one thousand nine hundred and thirteen, and published in the New Zealand Gazette of the thirteenth day of February, one thousand nine hundred and thirteen, regulations were made under the authority of the Post and Telegraph Act, 1908, for the conduct of post-office savings

And whereas it is desirable to amend such regulations in

the manner hereinafter set forth:
Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor-General of Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority conferred upon him by the Post and Telegraph Act, 1908, and the Post and Telegraph Amend-ment Act, 1919, and of all other powers and authorities in that behalf enabling him, and acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, doth hereby revelse the reculstions numbered twenty trye and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, doth hereby revoke the regulations numbered twenty-two, forty-two, and fifty-seven in the Schedule to the above-recited Order in Council, and doth make the regulations set forth in the Schedule hereto; and doth declare that the regulations hereby made shall be read with and form part of the above-recited regulations, and shall have effect on and after the date of publication of this Order in Council in the New Zealand Gazette.

#### SCHEDULE.

22. (1.) EVERY depositor shall enter the amount of each deposit made by him on the form of voucher supplied for the purpose by the Postmaster-General; he must also sign his name on the said voucher, and state thereon the address to which he desires that the acknowledgment hereinafter referred to may be transmitted.

Under no circumstances may a depositor enter any sum or make any entry whatever in the numbered book issued to

(2.) When a first deposit is made, a numbered book (in these regulations referred to as the "Depositor's Book") shall be handed to the depositor.

(3.) See Appendix, section 70, subsections (1), (2), and (3).
(4.) The acknowledgment of the Postmaster-General of the receipt of a deposit of £20 or more shall be signified by the Controller of the Post Office Savings-bank, or by such

[N.B.—Should any alteration or erasure appear to
have been made in this acknowledgment, or should it

have been made in this acknowledgment, or should it be inaccurate in any particular, it should be returned to the Controller, General Post Office, Wellington.]

(5.) Such acknowledgment shall be conclusive evidence of the fact and amount of the deposit. In the case of a deposit of less than £20 the entry in the depositor's book shall be conclusive evidence of title in the same manner as an acknowledgment by the Destmester Concert of adversit of £20 or ledgment by the Postmaster-General of a deposit of £20 or more, and it shall not be necessary to transmit any acknowledgment of a deposit of less than £20.

ledgment of a deposit of less than £20.

In order to allow a reasonable time for the receipt of such acknowledgment, the entry in the depositor's book shall be evidence of title for six weeks from the date of the lodgment of the deposit; and if such acknowledgment has not been received by the depositor through the post within one month from the date of his deposit, and the depositor has before or upon the expiry thereof demanded the said acknowledgment from the Postmaster-General, the entry in his depositor's book shall be evidence of title during another term of one month, and totics moties. month, and toties quoties.

If the sum mentioned in any acknowledgment is not identical with the sum actually deposited by a depositor, or the sum entered in such depositor's book or any other particulars are incorrect, he shall at once, by letter addressed to the Controller of the Post Office Savings-bank, call the attention of the Postmaster-General to the discrepancy.

57. (1.) The amount at credit of an account may, upon the application of the depositor, be transferred from the Post Office Savings-bank of New Zealand to the Government Savings-bank of Great Britain or that of any British possession or foreign country with which a reciprocal arrangement to that effect has been made; provided that the total amount standing at the credit of the account, inclusive of interest does not account the maximum sum which may be interest, does not exceed the maximum sum which may be deposited under the law of the country to which such transfer is desired.

(2.) Such application shall be made in the authorized form, which may be obtained at any savings bank, and shall be accompanied by the depositor's book, or by other evidence, to the satisfaction of the Postmaster-General, of the title of the applicant to the deposits to which the application relates.

(3.) There shall be paid by depositors to the Postmaster-General for the transfer of their accounts a fee regulated by

the rate of exchange between New Zealand and the country to which the transfers are to be made.

(4.) Where application is made to the Postmaster-General to accept transfer to the Post Office Savings-bank of New Zealand of any sum standing to the credit of a depositor in the Government Savings-bank of Great Britain or that of any British possession or foreign country with which a reciprocal arrangement to that effect has been made, the Postmaster-General may place such sum to the credit of that depositor's account in the Post Office Savings-bank.

(5.) Subject to the provisions of the Post and Telegraph Act, 1908, and its amendments, in so far as they relate to the conduct of the Post Office Savings-bank, and of these regulations, sums transferred to the Post Office Savings-bank of New Zealand from the Government Savings-bank of Great Britain or that of any British possession or foreign country shall for all purposes be treated as deposits made in the Post Office Savings-bank.

Revising of Press Telegram Rates.

THE HONOURABLE SIR WILLIAM FRASER PRESIDING IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by Order in Council dated the eighth day of July, one thousand nine hundred and nineteen, and published in the New Zealand Gazette of the twenty-fourth day of July, one thousand nine hundred and nineteen, regulations were made under the authority of the Post and Telegraph Act, 1908 (hereinafter termed "the said Act"), inter alia, fixing and determining the fees and rates to be demanded and received for the transmission of Press telegrams:

And whereas it is expedient to amend the regulations and fees for the transmission of such telegrams in the manner hereinafter set forth:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority conferred upon him by the said Act, and of all other powers and authorities in that behalf enabling him, and acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, doth hereby revoke the regulations, fees, and rates specified as Class 1A under the heading "Press Telegrams" in the above-recited Order in Council, and in lieu thereof doth make the regulations and fix the fees and rates set forth in the Schedule hereto for the same purpose; and doth hereby order that such regulations and such fees and rates shall form part of and be read together with the regulations first herein mentioned, and shall have effect on and from the date of publication of this Order in Council in the New Zealand Gazette.

Money-order Regulations .- Amendments.

At the Government Buildings at Wellington, this twentieth day of December, 1919.

THE RIGHT HONOURABLE W. F. MASSEY, P.C., PRESIDING IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by Order in Council dated the sixteenth day of December, one thousand nine hundred and seven, and published in the New Zealand Gazette of the thirty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred and seven, regulations were made under the authority of the Post Office Act, 1900, inter alia, fixing the rates of charges for the transmission through the medium of the Post Office or the electric telegraph, by means of money-orders, of money to and from places within and beyond New Zealand,

and prescribing the conditions subject to which money-orders may be issued: And whereas it is expedient to amend such rates of charges and conditions in the manner hereinafter set forth:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority conferred upon him by the Post and Telegraph Act, 1908, and acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, doth hereby revoke the rates of charges fixed and conditions prescribed under the heading "Commission chargeable on Money-orders" by the above-mentioned Order in Council, and in lieu thereof doth hereby fix the rates of charges and prescribe the condition set forth in the Schedule hereto; and doth direct that this Order in Council shall be read as part of the Order in Council first herein mentioned, and shall have effect on and from the date of its publication in the New Zealand Gazette.

#### SCHEDULE.

#### COMMISSION CHARGEABLE ON MONEY-ORDERS.

Commission chargeable on Money-orders issued for payment within New

#### ORDINARY ORDERS.

5. For each £5 or fraction of £5, 3d. The maximum amount for which a single order may be issued for payment in New Zealand is £40.

#### DOMESTIC ORDERS.

6. The maximum amount for which a Domestic Order may be issued is £5. charge for commission, which includes delivery fee, is 4d. for £5 or any portion thereof. Domestic money-orders may be obtained at any Money-order office in New Zealand for payment within the Dominion at the home or place of business of persons residing at places where a regular delivery is made by postman.

#### TELEGRAPH ORDERS.

7. For each £5 or fraction of £5, 3d., together with a telegraph fee of 1s. for each order. The maximum amount for which a single Telegraph Order may be issued is £40.

Money-order Telegrams may be sent as urgent upon payment of a telegraph fee of 2s. for each order in addition to the ordinary commission. Such telegrams will rate as Urgent Ordinary Telegrams and be sent in the order of their receipt with other telegrams of the like code. of the like code.

8. The remitter of a Money-order Telegram may have a private communication for the payee added to the official telegram of advice on paying for the additional words at the following rates: Ordinary, 1d. per word; urgent, 1d. per word, with no minimum charge.
