A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS it is enacted by the Town Boards Act, 1908, that the Governor-General may declare that any locality outside a borough wherein there are not less than fifty householders shall be a town district:

And whereas a petition has been presented to the Governor-General by the inhabitants within the area mentioned and described in the said petition, praying that such area may be constituted a town district under the Town Boards Act, 1908:

And whereas a Commission appointed in pursuance of section two of the Town Boards Amendment Act, 1912, held an inquiry, and reported that the locality defined in the said petition was suitable for municipal control, and made certain alterations of the boundaries thereof:

Now, therefore, I, Arthur William de Brito Savile, Earl of Liverpool, the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority vested in me by the Town Boards Act, 1908, and of all other powers enabling me in this behalf, do hereby proclaim and declare that the area described in the Schedule hereto, being the locality defined in the said petition, with boundaries as altered by the said Commission, shall be a town district, and the same is hereby constituted a town district, under the Town Boards Act, 1908, by the name of the Papatoetoe Town District. And, in further pursuance and exercise of the said powers, I do hereby proclaim, declare, and appoint that the Board of Commissioners for the said district shall consist of seven members.

SCHEDULE.

PAPATOETOE TOWN DISTRICT.

ALL that area in the Auckland Land District, situated in Blocks VI and X, Otahuhu Survey District, bounded, commencing at the westernmost corner of Lot 13, shown on plan deposited at the office of the District Land Registrar at Auckland, No. 9822, towards the north-west generally by Portage Road to the northernmost corner of Lot 27 on plan No. 9822 aforesaid; thence across the said Portage Road and by Buckland Road for a distance of 740 links; thence by a right line to a point on the western side of Station Road 1250 links from its junction with Portage Road; thence across and by the said Station Road to the south-western corner of Lot 2, a subdivision of part of Fairburn's Grant, and registered at the Deeds Office, Auckland, in Vol. R. 221, folio 74, and by the last-mentioned Lot 2, by the North Island Main Trunk Railway to the southern side of Portage Road; thence across the said railway and the aforesaid Portage Road to the Tamaki River, and thence by a right line to the south-western corner of Allotment 14, Parish of Manurewa; towards the north generally by the said Allotment 14, by a portion of Allotment 36, Parish of Manurewa aforesaid, containing 8 acres 0 roods 21·2 perches, shown on plan deposited as aforesaid No. 3156, and again by Allotment 14 aforesaid to and across the Great South Road, and by the north-western boundaries of Lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6, on plan deposited as aforesaid No. 6873; towards the north-east generally by the north-eastern boundary of the last-mentioned Lot 6, the crossing of a public road, by Lots 7, 21, 22, 23, and 25 on plan deposited as aforesaid No. 8105, and by the road forming the eastern boundary of Lot 26 on plan No. 8105 aforesaid to a point the production of the northern boundary of Lot 8, a subdivision of Allotment 18, Manurewa

Parish, registered in the Deeds Office, Auckland, in Vol. R. 139, folio 549, to and by the said northern boundary, by the northern and eastern boundaries of Lot 7 of the same subdivision and its eastern boundary produced across a public road, by the said public road to the north-western corner of the eastern portion of Lot 19 on plan deposited as aforesaid No. 7011, by the said eastern portion of Lot 19 and Lots 18 and 17 on plan aforesaid No. 7011; towards the south-east generally by Lot 12 on plan No. 7011 aforesaid, the crossing of the Great South Road, by Lots 1, 14, 13, 12, and 11 on plan deposited as aforesaid No. 9047, and the north-western boundary of the last-mentioned lot produced to and across Carruth Road; thence by a right line to the north-eastern corner of Lot 24 on plan No. 7551 deposited as aforesaid, by the north-eastern boundaries of the last-mentioned lot and Lots 25, 26, 27, and 28 on the aforesaid plan No. 7551; towards the south generally by Puhinui Road, by the North Island Main Trunk Railway to the north-western corner of Lot 39 on aforesaid plan No. 7551; thence by a right line to an angle in the south-western boundary of Lot 2 on plan No. 2833 deposited as aforesaid, bearing $346^{\circ} 5'$, distant 1997.2 links from the southernmost corner of Lot 2 aforesaid; thence in a southerly direction by the aforesaid Lot 2 for a distance of 850 links, thence by a right line to the south-eastern corner of Lot 18 shown on Town Plan No. 646, deposited in the Survey Office, Auckland, by the southern boundary of the said Lot 18 and its production across a road, and by Lot 17 on the aforesaid plan No. 646; and towards the south-west generally by the western boundary of Lot 20 on the aforesaid plan No. 646, the crossing of a road, by the western boundary of Lot 34 on the last-mentioned plan, by the south-western boundary of Lot 22 on Town Plan No. 645, the crossing of Hillside Road, by the western boundaries of Lots 21 and 20 on the aforesaid plan No. 645 to the northernmost corner of the last-mentioned lot; thence by a right line to the south-eastern corner of Lot 7 on plan deposited in the office of the District Land Registrar, Auckland, No. 9822, by the south-eastern boundaries of Lot 7 aforesaid, and Lots 8, 9, 10, and 11, on the aforesaid plan No. 9822, and by the south-western boundary of the last-mentioned Lot 11 and Lot 13 on aforesaid plan No. 9822, to the point of commencement.

Acclimatization District.*

LIVERPOOL, Governor-General.

IN exercise of the powers vested in me by the Animals Protection Act, 1908, I, Arthur William de Brito Savile, Earl of Liverpool, the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, do hereby exempt from the operation of section twenty-six of the said Act the Ashburton Acclimatization District, and do hereby notify that the following native game—viz., grey duck, black teal, and black swan—may be killed within the Ashburton Acclimatization District, comprising the County of Ashburton (except in the areas mentioned in the Schedule hereto), from the first day of May, one thousand nine hundred and nineteen, to the thirty-first day of July, one thousand nine hundred and nineteen, both days inclusive.

And I do further notify that the following native game—viz., paradise duck—may be killed within the above-mentioned district (except in the areas mentioned in the Schedule hereto) from the first day of May, one thousand nine hundred and nineteen, to the thirty-first day of July, one thousand nine hundred and nineteen, both days inclusive.

And I do hereby restrict the number of such native game that may be killed by any one person in any one day to not more than twenty head in all.

SCHEDULE.

AREAS WHEREIN NATIVE GAME SHALL NOT BE KILLED.

1. ALL that area in the Canterbury Land District, being the two small lakes known as Maori Lakes, situated in the Heron and Tripp Survey Districts, and the area included in a line running parallel to and twenty chains distant from the shores of those lakes.

2. All lands notified or set apart as sanctuaries or reserves for the preservation of imported or native game.

License Fee, &c., Auckland Acclimatization District.*

IN exercise of the powers vested in me by the Animals Protection Act, 1908, I, Arthur William de Brito Savile, Earl of Liverpool, the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, do hereby exempt from the operation of section twenty-six of the said Act the Auckland Acclimatization District, and do hereby notify that the following imported game—viz., cock pheasants and Californian and Australian quail—may be killed within the Auckland Acclimatization District, comprising all that area bounded towards the north-west generally by Kaipara Harbour and Otamatea County, thence towards the north-east by the sea to the south-western corner of Coromandel County, thence by Coromandel County to its south-eastern corner, thence towards the east generally by the sea to the northernmost corner of Tauranga County, thence by Tauranga County and Rotorua County to the summit of Puhenua Mountain, thence by a right line to the summit of Rangitoto Mountain, thence by West Taupo County and Kaitieke County to the north-eastern corner of Whangamomona County, thence towards the south by Whangamomona County to Clifton County, thence towards the west and again towards the south by Clifton County to the sea, and thence again towards the west generally by the sea to Kaipara Harbour, the place of commencement, including Great Barrier Island (except in the areas mentioned in the Schedule hereto), from the first day of May, one thousand nine hundred and nineteen, to the thirty-first day of July, one thousand nine hundred and nineteen, both days inclusive; and do hereby restrict the number of cock pheasants that may be killed by any one person in any one day to twelve. And I do further notify that licenses to kill such imported game within the said district shall be issued to any person on payment of the sum of twenty shillings each; and the Chief Postmasters at Auckland and Thames, and the Postmasters at Ahuroa, Aria, Avondale, Awakino, Ahwhitu, Bombay, Buckland, Cambridge, Clevedon, Devonport, Drury, East Tamaki, Ellerslie, Frankton Junction, Glen Murray, Gordonton, Hairini, Hamilton, Hamilton East, Helensville, Henderson, Hikutaia, Hinuera, Hobsonville, Howick, Hunua, Huntly, Kaipara Flats, Karangahake, Karekare, Kaukapakapa, Kawhia, Kihikihi, Kingsland, Kinohaku, Komata, Kumeu, Leigh, Manawaru, Mangaiti, Mangapehi, Manurewa, Marakopa, Maramarua, Makatana, Matamata, Matiere, Mauku, Mercer, Morrinsville, Mount Albert, Newmarket, Newton, Ngaruawahia, Northcote, Ohaupo, Ohura, Okoroire, Omaha, Onehunga, Onewhero, Ongarue, Otahuhu, Otorohanga, Paeroa, Pakuranga, Papakura, Papatoetoe, Parakakau, Paterangi, Patumahoe, Papiroa, Pirongia, Point Chevalier, Pokeno, Port Albert, Puhoi, Pukekawa, Pukekohe, Putaruru, Raglan, Rangiriri, Silverdale, Tahuna, Tairua, Takapuna, Tangitu, Taupiri, Te Aroha, Te Awamutu, Te Hana, Te Kuiti, Te Mata, Te Rauamo, Te Uku, Tirau, Tuakau, Turua, Waerenga, Waharoa, Waihi, Waihou, Waikino, Waikumete, Waimauku, Waorongomai, Waitekauri, Waitoa, Waitomo Caves, Waiuku, Waiwera, Walton, Waotu, Warkworth, Wellsford, Whatawhata, Whawharua, and Whitford, are hereby appointed to sign and issue the said licenses to kill imported game.

And I do further notify that the following native game—viz., grey duck, spoonbill duck, teal, pukeko, and black swan—may be killed within the above-mentioned district (except in the areas mentioned in the Schedule hereto) from the first day of May, one thousand nine hundred and nineteen, to the thirty-first day of July, one thousand nine hundred and nineteen, both days inclusive; and do hereby restrict the number of such native game that may be killed by any one person in any one day to not more than twenty-five head in all.

SCHEDULE.

AREAS WHEREIN IMPORTED AND NATIVE GAME SHALL NOT BE KILLED.

1. ALL that area in the County of Waitemata bounded on the north by the Wairau Creek from its mouth to the main road from Devonport to Waiwera; on the west by the said road to its junction with the Sea View Road; on the south by that road to the sea; and on the east by the sea to the point of departure.
2. All those areas at Waitakerei, Nihotapu, and Huia, in the County of Waitemata, vested in or under the control of the Auckland City Council for the purposes of waterworks, recreation, or the conservation of the native flora and fauna.
3. Little Barrier Island, Hauturu, Auckland (see *New Zealand Gazette* No. 104, of the 14th December, 1899, page 2266).
4. Hen and Chickens Islands.
5. All that area within a radius of three miles from the General Post-office, Auckland.
6. The Rangiriri (or Karaka) Lake, Waikato.
7. St. John's Lake and area adjacent (see *New Zealand Gazette* No. 43, of the 2nd May, 1901, page 986).
8. All that section, containing by admeasurement 141 acres, more or less, being the Hamilton Domain, including the Rotoiti or Hamilton Lake, Borough of Hamilton.
9. Fresh-water Lake, known as Lake Hakanoa, near Huntly, Waikato, and an area of five chains in width surrounding the said lake.
10. All that part of the Waihou River between the Waiorongomai Bridge and the Mangaiti Bridge over such river.

Special Shooting Season for Imported and Native Game, License Fee, &c., Buller Acclimatization District.

LIVERPOOL, Governor-General.

IN exercise of the powers vested in me by the Animals Protection Act, 1908, I, Arthur William de Brito Savile, Earl of Liverpool, the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, do hereby exempt from the operation of section twenty-six of the said Act the Buller Acclimatization District, and do notify that the following imported game—viz., hares—may be killed within the said Buller Acclimatization District, comprising the County of Buller (except in the areas mentioned in the Schedule hereto), from the first day of May, one thousand nine hundred and nineteen, to the thirty-first day of July, one thousand nine hundred and nineteen, both days inclusive; and do hereby restrict the number of hares that may be killed by any one person in any one day to twenty. And I do further notify that licenses to kill such imported game within the said district shall be issued to any person on payment of the sum of twenty shillings each; and the Chief Postmaster at Westport is hereby appointed to sign and issue the said licenses to kill imported game.

And I do further notify that the following native game—viz., grey duck, pukeko, and black swan—may be killed within the above-mentioned district (except in the areas mentioned in the Schedule hereto) from the first day of May, one thousand nine hundred and nineteen, to the thirty-first day of July, one thousand nine hundred and nineteen, both days inclusive; and do hereby restrict the number of such native game that may be killed by any one person in any one day to not more than twenty head in all.

ALL lands notified or set apart as sanctuaries or reserves for the preservation of imported or native game.

Special Shooting Season for Imported Game, License Fee, &c., Hobson Acclimatization District.

LIVERPOOL, Governor-General.

IN exercise of the powers vested in me by the Animals Protection Act, 1908, I, Arthur William de Brito Savile, Earl of Liverpool, the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, do hereby exempt from the operation of section twenty-six of the said Act the Hobson Acclimatization District, and do hereby notify that the following imported game—viz., cock pheasants, Australian and Californian quail—may be killed within the Hobson Acclimatization District, comprising all that area in the Auckland Land District, commencing on the sea-coast at the north-western corner of Block V, Waipoua Survey District, and bounded by the southern boundaries of Blocks I, II, III, and IV, Waipoua Survey District, to a public road, across that road, and by the western, southern, and south-eastern boundaries of Section 10, Block I, Tutamoe Survey District, to the north-eastern corner of the last-mentioned section, across a public road, and by the north-eastern boundaries of Sections 5, 6, and 7, Block V, Tutamoe Survey District, to the south-eastern corner of Section 5, Block I, Tutamoe Survey District; thence by the south-eastern boundaries of Sections 5, 4, 3, and 14 of the last-mentioned block, and part of the southern boundary of Section 5, Block II, Tutamoe Survey District, to the intersection of a line running between the north-western corner of Section 3, Block XIII, Punakitere Survey District, and Tutamoe Trig. Station; thence by the last-mentioned line to Tutamoe Trig. Station; thence generally by the northern and north-eastern boundary of Hobson County as described in *New Zealand Gazette*, 1911, page 3065, to the Otamatea County; thence by the northern boundary of Otamatea County as described in *New Zealand Statutes*, 1886, page 315, to the main road to Waipou; thence by the western side of that road through Maungaturoto to the Great North Road, and by the western side of that road to the eastern boundary of Otamatea County; thence by the eastern and southern boundaries of Otamatea County, the eastern and southern boundaries of Hobson County, to the sea; thence by the sea to the north-western corner of Block V, Waipoua Survey District, the place of commencement (except in the areas mentioned in the Schedule hereto), from the first day of May, one thousand nine hundred and nineteen, to the thirty-first day of July, one thousand nine hundred and nineteen, both days inclusive; and do hereby restrict the number of cock pheasants that may be killed by any one person in any one day to twelve. And I do further notify that licenses to kill such imported game within the said district shall be issued to any person on payment of the sum of twenty shillings each; and that the Postmasters at Maungaturoto, Paparoa, Pahi, Matakoho, Dargaville, Te Kopuru, Aratapu, Tangiteroria, Tangowahine, Kaihu, Mititai, Raupo, Ruawai, Batley, Hoanga, Mangawhare, Mareretu, Onetua, Naumai, Otamatea, Rehia, Tutamoe, Wairere, Whakapirau, and Tokatoka are hereby appointed to sign and issue the said licenses to kill imported game.

And I do further notify that the following native game—viz., grey duck, teal, pukeko, and black swan—may be killed within the above-mentioned district (except in the areas mentioned in the Schedule hereto) from the first day of May, one thousand nine hundred and nineteen, to the thirty-first day of July, one thousand nine hundred and nineteen, both days inclusive; and I do hereby restrict the number of native game that may be killed by any one person in any one day to twenty-five head in all.

SCHEDULE.

AREAS WHEREIN IMPORTED AND NATIVE GAME SHALL NOT BE KILLED.

ALL that area in the Auckland Land District, situated in Kai Iwi and Kaihu Survey Districts, Hobson County, being the lakes known as Lake Waikere, Lake Taharoa, and Lake Kai Iwi, and the area surrounding the said lakes included within a line running parallel to and forty chains distant from the margins of the said lakes: also the Lighthouse Reserve at Pouto Point (North Kaipara Head), containing 1,026 acres, more or less: also all that area in the Auckland Land District, formerly known as Pouto No. 2D, situated at the north head of Kaipara Harbour, in North Head and Okaka Survey Districts, and containing by admeasurement 3,333 acres, more or less, bounded towards the north by Sub-division 10A of Pouto No. 2E Block from the sea to the north-western boundary of the Crown land on which the lighthouse and signal-station are situated; thence towards the east by the above-mentioned Crown land to Kaipara Harbour; thence towards the south by Kaipara Harbour, and towards the west by the sea to the place of commencement: also all that land in the Auckland Land District, being Sub-division No. 10A of Pouto No. 2E Block, situated in North Head and Okaka Survey Districts, to the north of the

Special Shooting Season for Imported Game, License Fee, &c., Marlborough Acclimatization District.

LIVERPOOL, Governor-General.

IN exercise of the powers vested in me by the Animals Protection Act, 1908, I, Arthur William de Brito Savile, Earl of Liverpool, the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, do hereby exempt from the operation of section twenty-six of the said Act the Marlborough Acclimatization Society, and do hereby notify that the following imported game—viz., Californian quail—may be killed within the Marlborough Acclimatization District, comprising the Counties of Marlborough, Awatere, and Sounds (except in the areas mentioned in the Schedule hereto), from the sixteenth day of June, one thousand nine hundred and nineteen, to the thirty-first day of July, one thousand nine hundred and nineteen, both days inclusive; and do hereby restrict the number of such imported game that may be killed by any one person in any one day to not more than twenty-five head in all. And I do further notify that licenses to kill such imported game within the said district shall be issued to any person on payment of the sum of twenty shillings each; and the Chief Postmaster at Blenheim and the Postmasters at Havelock, Canvastown, Mahakipawa, Renwicktown, Timatanga, Keke-ranga, Picton, Nydia Bay, Seddon, Spring Creek, Ward, and Wairau Valley are hereby appointed to sign and issue the said licenses to kill imported game.

SCHEDULE.

AREAS WHEREIN IMPORTED GAME SHALL NOT BE KILLED.

ALL that area in the Marlborough Land District bounded towards the north-east by the ocean from the north-western end of the Boulder Bank, at the mouth of the Wairau River, to the south-eastern end of the Boulder Bank, at the north-eastern corner of Section No. 10 of Block II, Omaka, situate in Block III, Clifford Bay Survey District; thence towards the south generally by that section, Section 8 of Block I, Wakefield Downs, and Section 9 of Block II, Omaka, both of which sections are situate in Block III, Clifford Bay Survey District, to a point five chains distant from high-water mark of the Big Lagoon; thence by a line parallel to and five chains distant from high-water mark of the Big Lagoon through Sections 9 of Block II, Omaka, and 7 of Block I, Wakefield Downs, both of which sections are situate in Block III, Clifford Bay Survey District, to the channel between the Big Lagoon and Chandler's Lagoon; thence towards the west generally by the said channel to a small lagoon in Section 5, Opawa, situate in Block I, Clifford Bay Survey District; thence by the western side of that lagoon and a line parallel to and five chains distant from high-water mark of the Big Lagoon through Section 5 Opawa, public road, Crown land, and Section 3 Opawa, all of which sections are situate in Block I, Clifford Bay Survey District, aforesaid, to the channel in Section 3 Opawa, situate in Block I, Clifford Bay Survey District; thence by that channel through Sections 3, 4, 6, 9 Opawa, situate in Block I, Clifford Bay Survey District, aforesaid, and a line parallel to and five chains distant from high-water mark, through Section 9 Opawa, public road, 7 Opawa, public road, 8 Opawa, all of which are situate in Block I, Clifford Bay Survey District, aforesaid, to the southern side of the estuary of the Wairau River; thence by a right line across the said estuary in the direction of the Pilot-station to the west side of the mouth of the Wairau

River; and thence by a right line to the north-western end of the Boulder Bank, the place of commencement.

Also all that area in the Marlborough Land District known as Lake Grassmere, and the area within a line running parallel to and five chains distant from the margin of the said lake.

Also all that area in the Marlborough Land District, situated in Blocks VI and VII, Cape Campbell Survey District, being the lake known as Lake Elterwater, and the area surrounding the said lake included within a line running parallel to and forty chains distant from the margin of the said Lake Elterwater.

And I do further notify that licenses to kill such imported game within the said district shall be issued to any person on payment of the sum of twenty shillings each; and that the Chief Postmaster at Wellington and the Postmasters at Palmerston North, Sanson, Mangaweka, Taihape, Pahiataua, Eketahuna, Masterton, Carterton, Greytown, Martinborough, Featherston, Upper Hutt, Lower Hutt, Petone, Foxton, Otaki, Bull's, Hastwell's, Hunterville, Marton, Longburn, Alfredton, Bunnythorpe, Johnsonville, Kaitoke, Makuri, Manakau, Mauriceville, Moawhango, Nireaha, Ohau, Pahautanui, Paraparaumu, Pongaroa, Porirua, Shannon, Té Horo, Terrace End, Te Wharau, Tinui, Turakina, Waikanae, Wangaeahu, Levin, and Rongotea are hereby appointed to sign and issue the said licenses to kill imported game.

And I do further notify that the following native game—viz., grey duck, black swan, and teal—may be killed within the above-mentioned district (except in the areas mentioned in the Second Schedule hereto) from the first day of May, one thousand nine hundred and nineteen, to the thirty-first day of July, one thousand nine hundred and nineteen, both days inclusive; and do hereby restrict the number of such native game that may be killed by any one person in any one day to not more than twenty-five head in all.

FIRST SCHEDULE.

ALL that area in the Wellington Land District bounded towards the north-west and north generally by the Counties

of Wanganui, Waimarino, and East Taupo from the mouth of the Wangaehu River to the Rangitikei River, and the north-eastern corner of the County of Rangitikei; thence towards the east generally by the County of Hawke's Bay and the summit of the Ruahine Range to the Feilding and District Acclimatization District, as described in the *New Zealand Gazette* No. 38, 4th May, 1899; thence towards the south-west, south-east, and north-east generally by that district and the Counties of Dannevirke, Woodville, and Weber to the sea at the mouth of the Waimata River; and thence again towards the south-east, south, and west generally by the sea to the mouth of the Wangaehu River, the place of commencement; including adjacent islands (excepting Kapiti). The aforesaid area comprises the Counties of Hutt, Makara, Masterton, Featherston, Castlepoint, Wairarapa South, Pahiatua, Eketahuna, Mauriceville, Akitio, Horowhenua, Kairanga, and Rangitikei, and parts of the Counties of Manawatu, Oroua, and KIWITEA, together with the Boroughs of Carterton, Foxton, Greytown, Karori, Levin, Lower Hutt, Marton, Masterton, Onslow, Palmerston North, Pahiatua, Petone, City of Wellington, Eastbourne, Miramar, Taihape, Eketahuna, and Featherston, and the Town Districts of Hunterville, Johnsonville, Martinborough, Upper Hutt, and Mangaweka.

SECOND SCHEDULE.

AREAS WHEREIN IMPORTED AND NATIVE GAME SHALL NOT BE KILLED.

THE Wainui Forest Reserve, near Paraparaumu, Akatarawa Survey District, described in the *New Zealand Gazette* No. 12, of the 19th day of February, 1903; or within the area in the Haurangi, Waipawa, and Kaiwaka Survey Districts, described in the *New Zealand Gazette* No. 12, of the 19th day of February, 1903; or within the area known as the "mallard district," near Martinborough, described in the *New Zealand Gazette* No. 25, of the 9th day of April, 1896; or upon the area known as the Lausdowne Dam, near Masterton; or upon the Island of Kapiti, in the Kapiti Survey District, Land District of Wellington; or upon Lake Hokowhitu, or Te Ngutu Lagoon, and the area adjacent thereto, situated in the Borough of Palmerston North, as described in the *New Zealand Gazette* No. 10, of the 6th day of February, 1902; or in the Horowhenua Lake Reserve, as defined by the Horowhenua Lake Act, 1905; or upon the Totara Lake and the Kawhakahia Lake, in the County of Horowhenua, and an area of five chains surrounding the said lakes; or upon Sections 86, 87, 88 (and part of a closed road), 211, 266, and 267, and part of Section 89, Hutt District, part of which is owned and occupied by John Barton, Trentham, and the remainder is occupied as golf-links by the Wellington Golf Club, containing about 670 acres; or within that area, containing 154 acres, being Section No. 374, and part of Sections Nos. 372 and 373, Palmerston North, the said area being owned and occupied by Charlotte Sarah Slack; or within that area, containing 296 acres, at Longburn, being Sections Nos. 18, 20, and 21, Kairanga Survey District, the said area being owned and occupied by William Edward Arthur Slack and John Upton Gaskell Slack; or within that area in the Wellington Land District, containing by admeasurement 195 acres 3 roods 20 perches, more or less, and known as the Petone Waterworks Reserve; or within that area in the Wellington Land District, containing by admeasurement 209 acres 2 roods 29 perches, more or less, being Section No. 273, Block IV, Ararua Survey District, and known as the Waterworks Reserve, Palmerston North; or within that piece or parcel of land, containing by admeasurement 39 acres 2 roods 10 perches, more or less, being portion of Rural Section No. 1536 on the plan of the Borough of Palmerston North, and known as the Esplanade; or within that area in the Wellington Land District, at Foxton, containing by admeasurement about 1,500 acres, situated in Block III, Moutere Survey District, and Block IX, Mount Robinson Survey District, owned and occupied by Mr. Cresswell; or upon certain lagoons in Mangaone Survey District, the property of Mr. H. W. Bridge, Tatawai, and an area ten chains in width surrounding the said lagoons; or within that area in the Wellington Land District, the property of Mr. T. Scrimshaw, comprising Sections Nos. 26, 27, 28, 90, 91, and 212, situated at Trentham; or within that area, containing 981 acres 3 roods 6 perches, more or less, situated at Belmont, the property of the Belmont Land Company and Dr. H. W. M. Kendall respectively; also that part of Mangawharariki Stream and its bed as described in *Gazette* No. 66, of 9th July, 1914, page 2719.

Also all lands notified or set apart as sanctuaries or reserves for the preservation of imported or native game.

Special Shooting Season for Imported and Native Game, License Fee, &c., Whangarei Acclimatization District.

LIVERPOOL, Governor-General.

IN exercise of the powers vested in me by the Animals Protection Act, 1908, I, Arthur William de Brito Savile, Earl of Liverpool, the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, do hereby exempt from the operation of section twenty-six of the said Act the Whangarei Acclimatization District, and do hereby notify that the following imported game—viz., cock pheasants, Californian and Australian quail—may be killed within the Whangarei Acclimatization District, comprising the County of Whangarei and part of the County of Otamatea (except in the areas mentioned in the Schedule hereto), from the first day of May, one thousand nine hundred and nineteen, to the thirty-first day of July, one thousand nine hundred and nineteen, both days inclusive; and do hereby restrict the number of cock pheasants that may be killed by any one person in any one day to twelve, and the number of Californian quail to twelve. And I do further notify that licenses to kill such imported game within the said district shall be issued to any person on payment of the sum of twenty shillings each; and the Postmasters at Aponga, Hikurangi, Kamo, Kiripaka, Limestone, Mangapai, Mangawai, Maungakamea, Parakao, Parua Bay, Poroti, Ruakaka, Titoki, Waikiekie, Waipu, Whakapara, and Whangarei are hereby appointed to sign and issue the said licenses to kill imported game.

And I do further notify that the following native game—viz., black swan, grey duck, pukeko, and teal—may be killed within the above-mentioned district (except in the areas mentioned in the Schedule hereto) from the first day of May, one thousand nine hundred and nineteen, to the thirty-first day of July, one thousand nine hundred and nineteen, both days inclusive; and do hereby restrict the number of such native game that may be killed by any one person in any one day to not more than twelve head in all.

SCHEDULE.

AREAS WHEREIN IMPORTED AND NATIVE GAME SHALL NOT BE KILLED.

ALL that area in the Auckland Land District, containing by admeasurement approximately twenty-eight square miles, situated in Purua and Whangarei Survey Districts, and comprising all the land within the circumference of a circle having a radius of three miles, and its centre near the hatcheries at the intersection of the eastern boundary of Ketenikau No. 7, in Block VIII, Purua Survey District, with the north side of the road cutting off the extreme south-eastern corner of the said Ketenikau No. 7.

The boundary as exactly indicated above passes approximately through the places locally known as follows: Starting at the north it crosses Kauri Road just south of Big Mountain Trig. Station; thence going westerly and southerly it crosses the Ruatangata Road at Ngaraturua Settlement; afterwards crossing Three-mile Bush Road near Campbell's; after passing through State Forest Reserves of 1,580 acres and 1,600 acres it strikes Maunu Road near Black Bridge; crossing Otaika Road at Raumanga it passes to the south-east of the Borough of Whangarei, and crosses Head's Road at Reyburn's house; after crossing Whareora Road near the caves and Kiripaka Road near the church the boundary passes through Cork's Farm and back to starting-point; including the Borough of Whangarei and the Town District of Kamo.

Also all lands notified or set apart as sanctuaries or reserves for the preservation of imported or native game.

Certain Species of Birds indigenous to New Zealand not to be deemed protected.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government Buildings at Wellington, this twenty-ninth day of March, 1919.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL.

IN pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities vested in him by the Animals Protection Act, 1908, as amended by the Animals Protection Amendment Act, 1910, His Excellency the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the

Executive Council of the said Dominion, doth hereby suspend the operation of section ten of the said Animals Protection Amendment Act, 1910, for the period commencing on the first day of May, one thousand nine hundred and nineteen, and ending on the thirty-first day of July, one thousand nine hundred and nineteen, with respect to the species of birds indigenous to New Zealand mentioned in the Schedule hereto; and, with the like advice and consent, doth declare that such suspension shall be subject to the provisions contained in the Warrants in respect of the shooting season in each acclimatization district.

Notice.—Animals Protection Acts.—Protection of Native Birds.

Department of Internal Affairs,
Wellington, 27th March, 1919.

THE public are earnestly requested to assist in preserving for posterity the native birds of New Zealand.

Under the Animals Protection Amendment Act of 1910 all indigenous birds are protected. Every person who destroys or injures or captures any bird which is indigenous to New Zealand, including the outlying islands, or robs or destroys the nest of any such bird, is liable to a fine not exceeding £20. It is also illegal to keep native birds in captivity or to export the birds or their skins or feathers without the authority of the Minister of Internal Affairs.

NATIVE GAME.

Native game can only be shot during the open season, and then only such kinds of native game as are specified in the Annual Shooting-season Warrants.

CLOSE SEASON.

Under the Animals Protection Act, the year 1919 and every third year thereafter is a close season for both imported and native game.

BIRDS NOT PROTECTED.

By a notification published in the *New Zealand Gazette*, protection has been removed for the period ending 31st December, 1919, from hawks of all species, the kea, or mountain parrot, and from shags of the following species, namely: Black shag, white-throated shag, sea shag.

NATIVE GAME PROTECTED IN CLOSE SEASONS.

Black stilt plover, black swan, curlew, doterel, godwit, native pigeon, pied stilt plover, pukeko, teal, wild duck, wild goose.

INDIGENOUS BIRDS ABSOLUTELY PROTECTED.

Kiwis of all species, New Zealand quail and Chatham Island pigeon, rails and woodhens of all species, dabchick and grebe. Sea birds of all species, including penguins, petrels, storm petrels, shearwaters, fulmars, diving-petrels, albatross, terns, gulls, skuas, noddies, and shags (with exceptions noted above); also gannets, frigate-birds, and tropic birds. Wading-birds of all species, including turnstones, oyster-catchers, plovers, wry-bill plovers, avocets, sand-pipers, knots, snipe, herons, night-herons, reef-herons, and bitterns. Owls and parakeets of all species, and the kaka and kakapo, kingfisher, shining cuckoo, and long-tailed cuckoo. Rifleman and wrens of all species, tom-tits, warblers, robins, fantails, whiteheads, yellowheads, and fern-birds of all species. North and South Island thrushes and crows, creepers, stitch-birds, makomako, tui, silver-eye, pipit or native lark, huia, and saddleback. Blue mountain duck and Auckland Island duck. Southern merganser, moho (or takahe).
