EFFECT ON WAR LEGISLATION OF THE TERMINATION OF THE WAR ON 10TH JANUARY, 1920.

Act not affected by termination of war. Proclamation has been issued declaring notes to be legal tender until 31st December, 1922.

Remains in force until the expiry of two years after the termination of the war. (See 1918, No. 10, section 28.)

The War Regulations Act and amendments remain in operation for one year after the war or for such shorter period as the Governor-General may by Proclamation determine. (See 1916, No. 9, section 7.) All War Regulations remain in force for the same period unless sooner revoked.

Remains in force for six months after the termination of the war.

Expire 31st August, 1920.

This section commences to operate on expiry of six months after termination of war. (See 1917, No. 21, section 24.)
