

Prohibition of Issue of Money-orders and Transmission of Postal Correspondence in New Zealand in connection with New South Wales Community Hospital Art Union.

THE Postmaster-General of the Dominion of New Zealand having reasonable ground for supposing that the person whose name and addresses are shown in the Schedule hereunder is engaged in promoting or carrying out a lottery or scheme of chance, it is hereby ordered, under section 32 of the Post and Telegraph Act, 1928, that no money-order in favour of the said person shall be issued, and that no postal packet addressed to the said person (either by his own or any fictitious or assumed name), or addressed to either of the addresses in the Schedule hereunder without a name, shall be either registered or forwarded by the Post Office of New Zealand.

Prohibition of Issue of Money-orders and Transmission of Postal Correspondence in New Zealand in connection with Irish Free State Hospitals Sweepstake.

THE Postmaster-General of the Dominion of New Zealand having reasonable ground for supposing that the persons whose names and addresses are shown in the Schedule hereunder are engaged in promoting or carrying out a lottery or scheme of chance, it is hereby ordered, under section 32 of the Post and Telegraph Act, 1928, that no money-order in favour of any of the said persons shall be issued, and that no postal packet addressed to any of the said persons (either by his or her own or any fictitious or assumed name), or addressed to any of the addresses in the Schedule hereunder without a name, shall be either registered or forwarded by the Post Office of New Zealand.

Notice under the Shops and Offices Act, 1921-22, and its Amendment, fixing the Closing-hours of Chemists' Shops within the Borough of Hamilton.

WHEREAS a requisition in writing, signed by a majority of the occupiers of all the chemists' shops within the Borough of Hamilton, has been forwarded to me desiring that all such shops within the borough be closed in the evening of working-days as follows: On Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays at 5.30 p.m.; on Fridays, at 9 p.m.; and on Sundays, except during the time from 7 p.m. to 8 p.m.—with the following exceptions: (1) On the working-day immediately preceding Good Friday and on the working-day immediately preceding Anniversary Day, Anzac Day, or the King's Birthday, when any such day falls on a Friday, the hour of closing shall be 9 p.m.; (2) on the working-day immediately preceding Christmas Day and on the working-day immediately preceding New Year's Day the closing-hour shall be 10 p.m.; and (3) on New Year's Day, 2nd January, Good Friday, Easter

Monday, Anzac Day, the King's Birthday, Labour Day, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day the closing-hour shall be 8 p.m.:

And whereas, I, Adam Hamilton, Minister of Labour, am satisfied that the signatures to such requisition represent a majority of the occupiers of all the said shops within the said borough:

Now, therefore, in pursuance of section 32 of the Shops and Offices Act, 1921-22, I do hereby direct that on and after the 8th day of August, 1932, all the chemists' shops within the Borough of Hamilton shall be closed accordingly.

The notice dated the 25th August, 1914, and published in the *New Zealand Gazette* of the 27th August, 1914, fixing the closing-hours of chemists' shops in the Borough of Hamilton is hereby cancelled as from the date of the coming into operation of this notice.

NOTES.—(1) Pursuant to section 21 (e) of the Shops and Offices Act, 1921-22, a chemist may keep his shop open (but only for the supply of medicines and surgical appliances) between the hours of 7 p.m. and 9 p.m. on the statutory closing-day; (2) pursuant to section 35 (4) of the same Act, a chemist may supply medicines and surgical appliances that are urgently required on Sundays and on working-days outside the hours specified above, provided that the shop is opened for such purpose only and is closed immediately the sale is effected, and that the door of the shop is kept locked, except for the admission and exit of the customer.

The Industrial Conciliation and Arbitration Amendment Act, 1932.—Notice of Cancellation of Award.
